Parking Area to Overlook Pavilion

(0.66 mile; accessible trail 6' wide compacted stonedust surface with typical grade of 7% and 3 spots of over 8%) The trail leads through open fields enclosed by woodlands, creating the impression of a series of outdoor "rooms." The Overlook Pavilion is a great place to rest in the shade.



Overlook Pavilion to Summerhouse (0.25 mile)

Beyond the pavilion, the trail forks. Turn right to follow an old farm road (the historic Poets' Walk) through the woods. It descends via two small bridges to the Summerhouse.



Overlook Pavilion to The Lookout (0.5 mile)

Turn left at the fork just beyond the Overlook Pavilion and descend gently through meadows to enjoy views encompassing the Hudson River and Catskill Mountains. (For your safety, **do not cross** the footbridge over the railroad tracks.)
